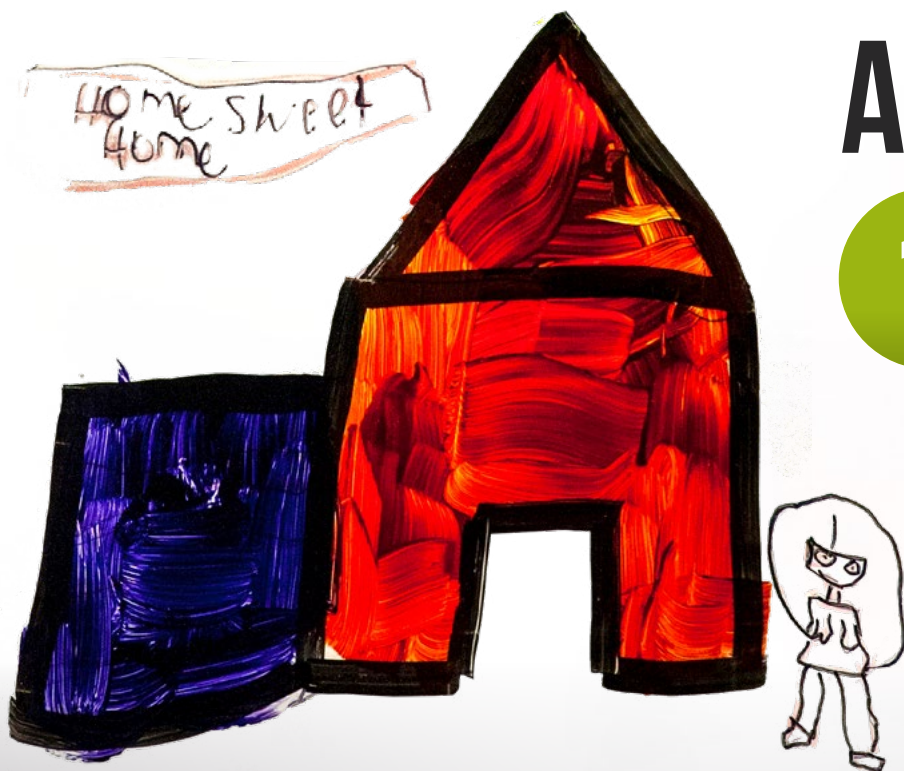

Funding our plans

Our community sees the benefit of Council services in cleaner streets, safer roads, places to play and places to meet. That is why we will invest more than \$104.5 million towards important projects and services that impact upon you every day.

Our plan for 2019/20 is a responsible budget with investment in the foundations of our City. We are budgeting for an operating surplus and have realised \$2.6 million worth of savings, through a vigorous continuous improvement program. The realisation of these savings have contributed to Council's ability to budget for a surplus in 2019/20, as well as a positive impact on Council's debt position going forward.

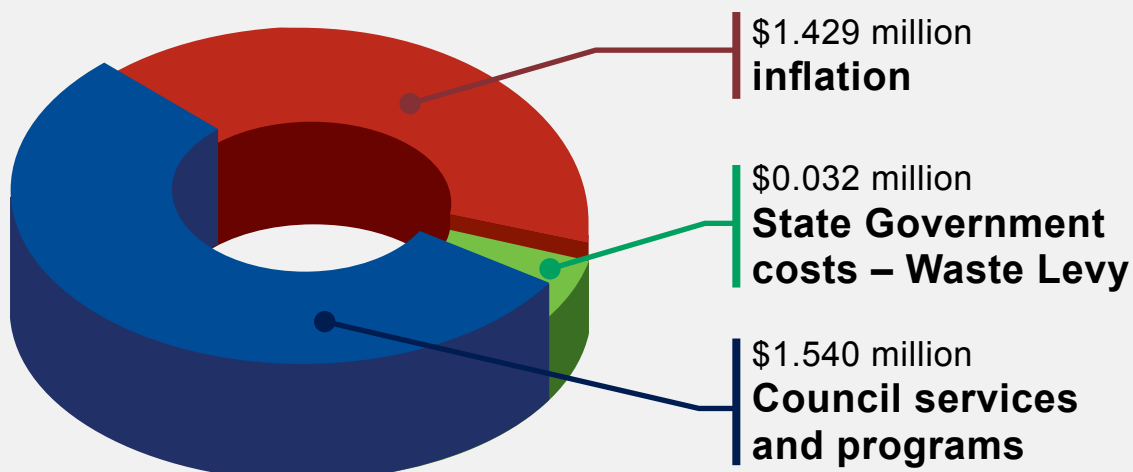
Rates for 2019/20

While we strive to minimise the impact of rates on the community, inflation affects everyone. Council has taken into account inflationary cost pressures that impact on the delivery of existing services and will increase rates by 1.9 per cent to cover this.

There will be a further increase of 2.0 per cent to cover the cost of introducing the 19 new and enhanced services. It equates to a total rate rise of 3.9 per cent.

For an average residential property valued at \$242,000, rates will increase by \$61 per year, or \$1.17 per week.

THE PROPOSED RATE INCREASE WILL GENERATE \$3.001 MILLION IN NEW REVENUE AND WILL COVER:

Council budget prepares for our future

Our community is growing and we are building a city to meet the needs of a population that will reach 131,700 people by 2036, the state's bicentenary.

As part of our preparations for the future, the City of Playford develops an annual budget.

The 2019/20 Draft Annual Business Plan is now out for public consultation, meaning you can have your say on how we run your city.

The draft budget outlines how we spend our rates and the projects you can expect to see being undertaken in your community over the next financial year.

In 2019/20, the City of Playford is budgeting for a surplus, delivering our services and programs within our budgeted operating revenue.

We have also realised \$2.6 million worth of savings, through a vigorous continuous improvement program.

The realisation of these savings have contributed to Council's ability to budget for a surplus in 2019/20, as well as a positive impact on Council's debt position going forward.

Elizabeth Grove project wins award

A City of Playford project that saw Council work with Elizabeth Grove residents to enhance health and wellbeing in their suburb has won a major award.

Playford took out the metropolitan honour in the Minister for Health and Wellbeing Excellence in Public Health Awards, which were presented last month.

The three projects undertaken in Elizabeth Grove following consultation with local residents were:

- Safety improvements and community art in the laneway linking Fairfield Road and Afford Street;
- Fruit trees in public spaces at Burgate Reserve;
- Free sports-equipment library at Secombe Street Reserve.

NAWMA's landfill excellence

The Northern Adelaide Waste Management Authority (NAWMA) has won a national award for its innovative development of the Uleybury Balefill and Renewable Energy Park.

The National Waste Management and Resource Recovery Association presented NAWMA with the 2019 Excellence in Landfill Innovation Award for the Uleybury site.

The site was acknowledged as a world-class landfill with pioneering developments including Australia's first solar thermal and

methane gas renewable energy facility, which exports enough power to the grid to service 1900 homes annually.

The award is another milestone in NAWMA's commitment to building a circular economy by minimising waste to landfill, maximising resource recovery, creating renewable energy, supporting local jobs and manufacturing and a sustainable environment.

The Lyell Mac's 60 years of serving the north

The Lyell McEwin Hospital celebrated its 60th anniversary of service to the people of the northern suburbs on April 22.

City of Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty said the Lyell McEwin Hospital has grown with our community, adapting to changing needs and building a proud record of service and medical innovation.

“Affectionately known as the ‘Lyell Mac’, our hospital’s place in history will soon become even more significant as the centre piece of the Playford Health Precinct,” Mayor Docherty said.

“The Health Precinct will expand on the hospital’s capacity by attracting a cluster of allied health services that will serve the local community and the wider northern region – providing more services, jobs and opportunity for the north.

“As an employee at the Lyell McEwin Hospital I’m proud to say that its role in our community will be celebrated, now and into the future.”

Since 2002, a major State Government-funded three-stage redevelopment program of the Lyell McEwin Hospital worth in excess of \$300 million has been underway and this year a further \$58M expansion to its Emergency Department is taking place, enhancing the hospital’s position as Playford’s biggest single employer.

This major development coincides with the approaching construction of further health facilities on the western side of the hospital.

ACH Group is collaborating with the Northern Health Consortium to develop the Healthia project, with plans to construct two purpose-built multi-level clinical buildings.

Tenants for public and private ambulatory care services, mental health services, diagnostic imaging, pathology, general practice services, medical consulting rooms and childcare are currently being sought, while a new multi-storey car park will also be built to increase parking options within the precinct.

ACH Group will also develop ViTA on the north-western corner of the Healthia site,



which will include up to 120 residential care places with a holistic wellbeing focus, plus associated services including café, hairdresser and resident gym.

A tender for construction of the ViTA site is now underway.

“Future expansion in this area will see the creation of strong jobs growth both in health service roles and the many support services that hospitals and allied health providers require, we look forward to this new health future and the Lyell McEwin Hospital playing its part in that growth,” Mayor Docherty said.





What's happening in the Playford CBD

Over the next two years, visitors and residents of Playford will see as many as four new construction projects around the Playford CBD and Prince George Plaza.

During the construction period, our key services will remain open to the public.

HERE'S WHAT ELSE IS HAPPENING IN OUR CBD:

1 Prince George Plaza - Completed

The Plaza is a meeting place and venue for activities, events and cultural experiences and links new and existing retail, commercial, hospitality and entertainment facilities. The Plaza will be open throughout CBD construction.

2 Grenville Hub – Coming soon

A new Grenville Hub for Playford's over 50s is being built right next to the Playford Civic Centre. Construction is expected to start later this year. Full Grenville programs are continuing in the Civic Centre.

3 CBD Hotel – Coming soon

Construction of the privately developed 4.5 star six-storey hotel, with over 200 rooms, is expected to start later this year and will provide accommodation for visiting professionals and tourists exploring SA's wine regions and the Mid North. It will bring employment and economic growth for our community.

4 Medical Hub – Coming soon

Building of a privately developed Medical Hub will start in 2019. The multi-storey facility will support growth in the region's health service needs and provide access to GPs, specialists and allied health practitioners.

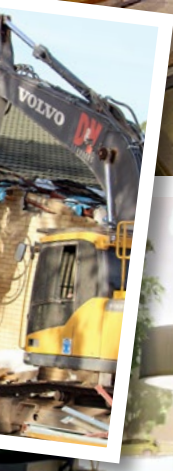
5 Family Restaurant and Café – Nearly finished

Two new outlets are being built in Prince George Plaza – one of which will house Fasta Pasta, expected to open later this year.

Interest is being sought for the second tenancy.

6 Windsor Carpark - Open

With capacity for more than 360 vehicles, the Windsor Carpark is key to attracting the CBD's proposed hotel, retail ventures, medical hub, and other initiatives – projects that will greatly increase CBD visitation. The carpark is expected to be initially underutilised until future CBD developments bring more visitors.

The year of robotics

We've all watched Robot Wars and envied the skills and know-how of the competitors who are creating their epic fighting robots.

Now you too can have the power.

Throughout 2019, the City of Playford library is building its STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) programs to include:

- Beginner and intermediate robotics workshops;
- Beginner and intermediate coding workshops;
- CAD programming and 3D-printing workshops;
- Robotics club.

"These sessions are open to children, teens and adults and teach them how to develop real-world skills for STEAM career pathways that will help them now and into the future," program coordinator Matthew Turner said.

learning how to code and other fun projects.

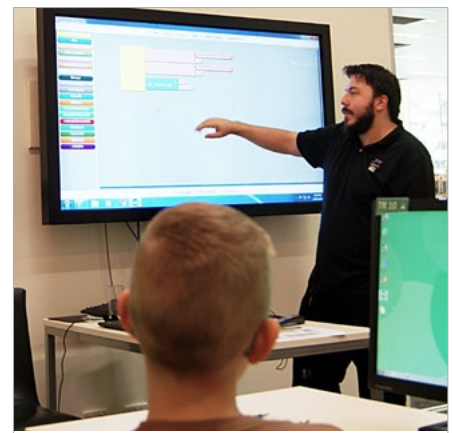
"Robotics and coding is important because it is a big part of making (computer/video) games," she said.

Food health in the front line of Smart Working

City of Playford staff are always seeking ways to work more efficiently and better service the public and with that in mind our environmental health officers (EHOs) are leading the way with smart technology.

EHO staff are the frontline officers who make sure that all health requirements are being met in the following areas:

- Food premises,
- Pool and spa facilities,
- Hair, beauty and skin penetration businesses,
- General public health complaint inspections.

This year our EHOs have begun conducting inspections using a mobile device rather than the old-fashioned paper-based process.

The result of this change of process benefits the business as well as their customers through:

- Improved engagement with the business,
- Increased regularity of inspections,
- Decreased risk of non-compliance.

EHO Ryan Sutton said he has found the process more

efficient, with the added bonus that he can spend greater time developing professional relationships with local businesspeople.

"It's good because it enables us to do paperwork more efficiently and all of the details are linked with our customer reports, including any photographs that we take," Ryan said.

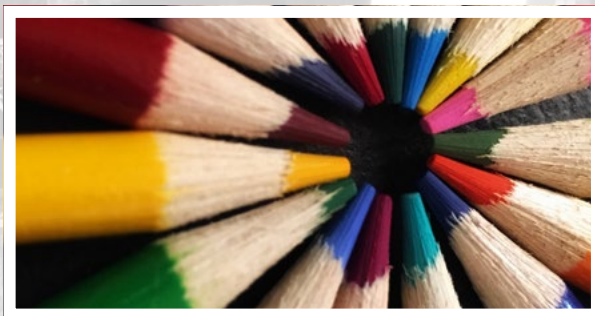

NDIS business support success

Since August, the Stretton Connect: NDIS Business Support Program has supported 20 local businesses to navigate the challenges faced by new, small-to-medium enterprises entering the disability market.

Fortnightly workshops at the Stretton Centre cover business planning, finance, marketing, and human resources, while one-on-one mentoring to address specific business requirements is also provided.

Kerri Hay, director and founder of Healing Through Arts, has seen the benefits of this Stretton Centre support.

“Since commencing the program I have received a diverse range of business support that has enabled me to increase my client base and hire additional staff,” Kerri said.

The pilot program has created 42 jobs and supported an additional 135 new clients across the participating businesses, providing diversity in the services available to National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) participants.

“The program is unique to South Australia, created in partnership and in response to the opportunities driven by the implementation of the NDIS in the northern suburbs of Adelaide,” Stretton Centre director Dermot Cussen said.

The program has also been nominated by LG Professionals as a finalist in its SA Leadership Excellence Awards in the Excellence in Local Economic Development category.

The Stretton Connect: NDIS Business Support Program is funded by the Government of South Australia’s Department for Industry and Skills and delivered in collaboration with the National Disability Services.

Giving health a kick along

The Grenville Hub is breaking new ground for martial arts programs – introducing the discipline to over 50s in Adelaide's north.

Under the guidance of John Connelly, the Sports Martial Arts Club is giving Playford residents the chance to learn new skills, keep fit and healthy and compete for Australia in international competition.

Among the foundation members is Mel Riley who has taken up martial arts to improve her health and has lost 90 kilograms since 2012 as part of an ongoing fitness campaign.

"Give it a go – you will absolutely enjoy it. John breaks it down to your level and builds you up," Mel said.

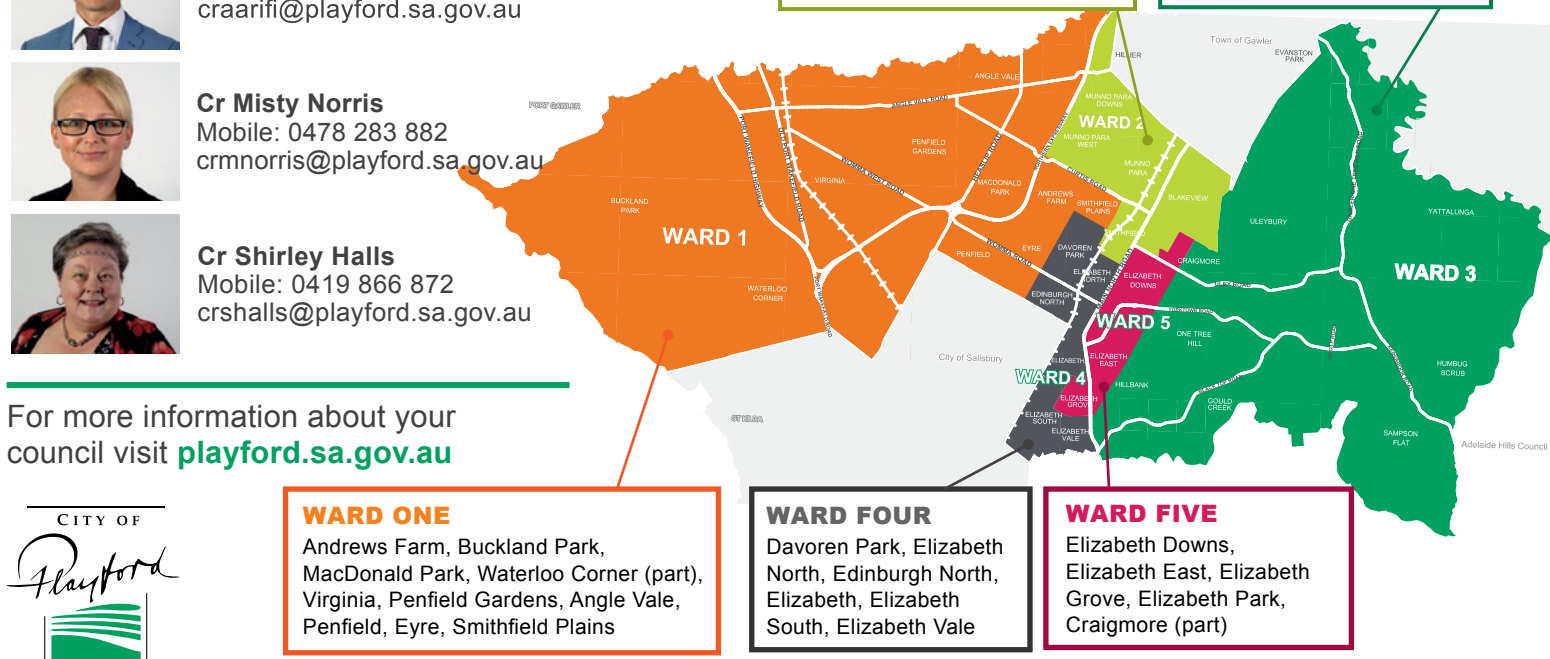
