





SOLID WASTE LEVY – \$534,000

The Solid Waste Levy is a State Government tax on waste sent to landfill.

In June, the State Government announced a significant increase to this levy in its budget with no consultation. This has resulted in an additional cost pressure of \$534,000 on Council's budget.

This unexpected and unreasonable increase to the levy cannot be absorbed by Council. Therefore, the State



Government's decision has a direct impact on council rates.

This decision is particularly disappointing given the City of Playford has been proactively working with our community to keep waste costs to a minimum. We deliver high quality waste management services through the Northern Adelaide Waste Management Authority (NAWMA), including waste-minimisation initiatives such as recycling programs and a green waste service.

Through our co-ownership of NAWMA, Playford residents were protected from the shock of the 'China Sword' policy that hit other councils across the state.

We achieved this by managing our own recyclables, keeping jobs locally and bringing revenue to our community. However, rather than be rewarded for our proactivity, this levy hits us harder than most councils due to our large and growing population.

To help reduce the impact to the levy we encourage everyone to reduce the amount of waste placed in the red bin by:

Placing food scraps, tissues and paper towels in your green bin

Recycle plastic, glass, steel and aluminium in your yellow bin

Balancing growth and development

The City of Playford is one of the fastest growing council areas in South Australia.

We are proud to be at the forefront of growth in our state, but accommodating growth requires balancing ongoing investment with our community's capacity to fund new services and assets, which is why our Annual Business Plan and Budget is so important.

In the 2019/20 ABP, delivery of existing core services makes up approximately 98 percent of the budget.

We will invest \$105 million into these grassroots services which will deliver footpath maintenance, rubbish removal, verge mowing, sports facilities, libraries, playgrounds and more.

We will fund the construction of the new Grenville Community Connections Hub, providing a new space to deliver a range of services promoting lifelong learning and activity for our over 50s community.

Further investment in a traffic management study program will bust congestion and address road safety concerns.

A number of legislative changes have impacted this budget, including the Local Nuisance and Litter Control Act and the Commonwealth Disability Discrimination Act (DDA).

But one of the most significant impacts has been the State Government's unexpected announcement to increase the Solid Waste Levy. This has resulted in an unprecedented additional \$534,000 to Council's budget.

Despite this disappointing impost, we are proud to have realised \$2.6 million in ongoing savings and to be budgeting for an operating surplus.

It is an achievement that builds on a rigorous continuous improvement effort, having already saved \$13.1 million ongoing from our operating budget over seven years.

This plan provides a solid foundation to develop smarter approaches to how we address debt and financial sustainability and continually work to match our community's expectations for financial management.

Powerline removal starts Virginia upgrade

The first stage of the City of Playford's Virginia main street upgrade will start early next year with the undergrounding of powerlines along Old Port Wakefield Road.

Council has received approval for the \$2.6m undergrounding project from the Power Lines Environment Committee (PLEC).

"Virginia residents will be excited to know that this funding means we can start the upgrade of Virginia's main street in earnest," City of Playford Mayor Glenn Docherty said. "Removing the powerlines will have an immediate impact on the town's beautification, giving it a fresh outlook as we prepare for the upgrade's next stages."

Council's financial contribution to the upgrade is \$877,404 (\$40,000 in-kind), accounting for over one third of the project costs.

Construction activities associated with undergrounding the power lines will be undertaken by SA Power Networks, with works scheduled to occur between January and June 2020.



Public consultation for the remaining works to design and deliver the streetscaping for the upgrade, extending roughly from the Virginia Oval entrance to the Sheedy/Penfield Street intersection, will commence this month.

"We're looking forward to beginning an extensive community engagement phase and hope Virginia residents will get right behind us in helping to shape their town's future," Mayor Docherty said.

he air above Playford will be filled with excitement on 9 and 10 November when the 2019 Edinburgh Air Show takes place.



Tickets are now available for the event, which offers a rare opportunity for the people of Adelaide to

visit the base and see some of the Australian Defence Force's (ADF) most advanced military aircraft and technologies.

Air Force Head of Air Shows, Air Commodore Christopher Sawade, said the Edinburgh Air Show will showcase a wide variety of fast jet, transport and rotary wing aircraft.

"Our newest maritime patrol aircraft, the Edinburgh-based P-8A Poseidon, will have pride of place alongside our fast jets - including the F/A-18 Hornet - and heavy lift aircraft like the C-17A Globemaster," Air Commodore Sawade said.

"The F-35A Joint Strike Fighter will also be on display for the first time in Adelaide." This will be the first ADF Air Show at RAAF Base Edinburgh in 12 years.



Path paves the way to good health

A walking and cycling trail that connects
Stebonheath Wetlands to Craigmore is
helping kids get to school and giving local
residents greater healthy exercise options.

Overall 4.7 kilometres of new block footpath, with linkages, was recently installed from Main North Road to Yorktown Road, significantly extending the trail.

DID YOU KNOW?

Physical activity is widely recognised as being beneficial to our health and well-being. However, six in 10 Australian adults and one in four children are overweight or obese (2011, ABS).

In response, active living is being promoted to integrate physical activity into our daily routine.

As well as improving health and well-being, cycling and walking support environmental sustainability, safe communities, robust economies and reduce vehicular traffic congestion.

The path, known as the Smith Creek
Trail, incorporates the Elephant Walk at
Smithfield and connects to the Stuart O'Grady
Bikeway (adjacent the Northern Expressway)
via Curtis Road, along with creating linkages
to Playford neighbourhoods along its length.

The path follows Smith Creek and has created a linear-park-style trail that not only allows greater access to our natural environment, but encourages residents to walk, run, ride their bikes or walk their dogs in a relaxing setting.

A further benefit is that the walking trail, particularly in the Blakeview area, provides linkages to the school and childcare cluster at Blakeview that includes Blakeview Primary School, Trinity College and Craigmore High School.

In total, more than 13,200m² of new Keypave Paver, which is equivalent to over 415,200 pavers, was laid in the project.

Emma, who has been a resident of Craigmore for a decade, always enjoyed having the natural attraction of Smith Creek on her doorstep and now she and her family get to enjoy it more regularly.

"I absolutely love it, it's so much easier to walk the kids down here with the prams and the dog and everything else," Emma said.

"I've been using the trail from the minute the pavers went up. I was straight down here."

She said that her children can now more easily accompany her when they walk the dog.

The path winds itself along and around Smith Creek, with bridge crossings in several locations, along with linkages into residential areas.
