
It's not rubbish.

As we're becoming more aware of our environmental footprint, ensuring our household items are disposed of correctly is becoming increasingly important.

One of the ways we're supporting your efforts to make the most of your unwanted household items is our hard waste collection service, managed by your resource partner NAWMA.

The free service not only supports you to reduce your environmental footprint while decluttering your household, it is also friendly on your wallet or purse.

You may be finished with that old fridge, furniture or toys, but it's possible that we can help give those items a second life through our hard waste collection service so it avoids going to landfill.



- 1. You can have it collected from your home twice a year. Items collected by NAWMA are crushed and the components recycled.
- Or you can exchange one (or both) of those collections for a voucher. Simply drop it to NAWMA yourself at a time that's convenient for you.

TIP: If you have any good quality household, building, and garden items - drop them off at the Salvage and Save recycle shop at NAWMA's Edinburgh North location. This helps us divert items still in good nick going to landfill, supports employment opportunities for those with a disability and will provide a lucky shopper an awesome discount!

So don't think of it as rubbish, it's potentially a resource for someone else!









Did you know?

- · All residents in Playford are entitled to two free hard waste collections a year.
- · It's an 'at call' service any time of the year. This means your hard waste pick up date will occur within four to six weeks.
- You can exchange your collection/s with a voucher so you can take your hard waste to NAWMA when it suits you.
- NAWMA will lend you a trailer for free! You will need to book and a deposit is required.

The nitty gritty...

- To keep a smooth collection process, we must ask items to be neatly stacked inside your property line and not on the kerb - as it could be mistaken for illegally dumped rubbish.
- Items must be out before 7am on collection day.
- There is a 2m x 1m limit and smaller items must be placed in a cardboard box/es.





Playford covers 345 sq km's, and we can't be everywhere at once – so we really appreciate your eyes and ears when it comes to identifying issues which need attention.

We've jumped into some data and below is a few of our most reported items and common questions coming through our call centre so far this year.

Your top questions:

"How do I sign up to the new Playford Online Services to get info and view my rates notice?"

If you are an existing Formsport customer, you can elect to sign in to our Playford Online Services.

Information is being emailed to you about registering. If you haven't previously accessed Online

Services, you can register directly to reportandpay.playford.sa.gov.au at the 'Ratepayer Registration' button. Just make sure to have your rates notice handy which will have your registration details.

"My bin wasn't picked up this week - what do I do?"

Occasionally bins can be missed in the weekly kerbside collection. If you give NAWMA a call on 8259 2100 as soon as possible after you notice it has been overlooked, they may be able to send a truck in the afternoon or the next day to pick it up.

"My neighbour has a persistently barking dog – how can I report it?"

If you have a good relationship with your neighbour, you could chat to them about it. They may not even know their dog is barking. If you need to report it to us, the first step is to keep a diary of when the dog barks to use as evidence in your report. You can download a 'Nuisance Dog Form and Diary' directly from the Playford website.



United communities

Our untold story on the bushfire crisis response

"That was probably the longest hour of my life."

"The day started like any other day would start, chaotic and hectic."

This was Lisa Cavanagh, a manager at the City of Playford, as she described one of the most intense experiences of her life.

Lisa was part of a convoy of Council staff who assisted as three bushfires across Adelaide Hills and on Kangaroo Island threatened land, homes and lives.

She was responsible for coordinating ground crews clearing and repairing roads, as well as establishing fire breaks.

"The CFS were worried about the weather this day and true to form we got a call saying the wind had changed for the worse and the fire front was heading towards Parndana," Lisa said.

This was the moment her crew were unable to return back to base as a ferocious blaze approached them near Parndana on Kangaroo Island.

More than 20 councils across the State were involved in response to the bushfire crisis through the Local Government Function Support Group.

With access to trained personnel and plant equipment, Councils played a vital role.

Derek Langman from the City of Playford also provided support during the emergency as he worked with the lead agencies.

"We were known within incident control as the team that could get things done," he said.

"Our processes and our communication were developed, and we had enough local government people who responded to the call to support, which meant we had the resources to do something and actually make a massive difference."





set up in this country to respond quite quickly and there are professionals that can help, and get things done."

In times of crisis, people and organisations ban together to support those in need.

Local Government was no exception.

This shared experience, amidst the tragedy, united communities.

"We all worked together as a tight knit group and you know that was 23 councils, at different times, working together. It was quite an achievement from day one walking in as strangers and walking away part of the family," Lisa said.

A tribute to our servicemen and women

"Dear brother with heart so true, Though you will never return again, There's a lot at home thinking of you." A message from Annie to her brother, Edward.

At the young age of 18, Edward Blackman from Smithfield, enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force.

Four months after enlistment, Edward left Adelaide where he docked in Plymouth, England.

In November 1917, he became attached to the 8th Training Battalion which proceeded to Havre in France to reinforce the 48th Battalion.

Only four months later in April 1918, Edward was killed in action, he was only 19.

No place was unaffected by war. More than 170 people from the Playford area enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force during World War One with many of these soldiers not returning home.

Services across Playford are an opportunity to pay respect to more than 100,000 who have given their lives in service, as well as those who continue to serve in all wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations all over the world.

The City of Playford has a proud tradition of commemorating Anzac Day with local services commencing on its eve.





Flinders University comes to Munno Para's Stretton Centre

High school leavers and individuals seeking a career change will be able to access one of Flinders University's most popular pathways to university, the *Flinders Foundation Studies* program, from Munno Para's Stretton Centre in 2020.

Currently over 2,000 students from the northern suburbs are studying across a range of disciplines at Flinders University. However, for many people location can be a barrier to accessing tertiary education, which is why it is important to have a university presence in Playford.

When Kelei Deng commenced the *Flinders Foundation* Studies program in 2012 while living in the northern suburbs of Adelaide, it meant a two hour bus journey, on two buses to travel to classes in Bedford Park.

According to Kelei the long journey was worthwhile.

After completing foundation studies she went on to study a Bachelor of Arts with International Relations and Business.

"Doing foundation studies helped me get ahead of other university students as I gained practical skills such as how to structure an essay and reference, which gave me the confidence to become a leader in some of my classes," said Kelei.

However, Kelei acknowledges that the distance is too great a barrier for many.

"University opens new doors for you, I'm glad others living in northern Adelaide won't have to experience the long bus trek to complete their foundation studies like I did," she said.

The program is free to eligible applicants, with no prerequisites and successful graduates are guaranteed entry into a selection of undergraduate courses delivered by Flinders University.

Two Flinders Foundation Studies programs will run from the Stretton Centre in 2020, the second semester commences on Tuesday, 7 July.

Building on the rich musical history of Adelaide's north

Music plays an integral role in our lives. It stirs emotions and brings people together through creative expression.

The City of Playford has a rich music history and continues to see this industry develop through young upcoming artists.

In the 1970's Elizabeth transformed into the epicentre of rock music when bands such as The Angels and Little River Band skyrocketed into the charts. It was these musicians and bands, now Aria Hall of Fame inductees, which started their music careers in the pub rock scene of Elizabeth. Local musicians such as Jimmy Barnes, Doc Neeson, Glen Shorrock and John Swan played a significant role in shaping Aussie rock.

Today we continue to embrace our proud history as it transitions into a thriving new wave of music.

Northern Sound System (NSS), opened in 2007, has adopted a culture of inspiring upcoming artists through their own music aspirations. Thanks to its supporting and nurturing environment, we see new artists breaking ground in a variety of genres.

Hip Hop: An influential youth culture

Hip Hop has made strong grounds as an art and cultural movement in the north.

Independent rapper, Barnabas Johnson also known as Barnaba\$, is part of this urban community making waves in the local music scene.

"North side is the next wave," he said. "Hip Hop keeps evolving, it's never the same."

But despite its evolution, the traditional elements of this influential art form remains.

"My dream is for my music to impact and connect with people around the world," BaRnaba\$ said.

"That's where Hip Hop started, sending a message or standing for something, and that's what my music is about. It's about being fun, but making an impact at the same time."

For BaRnaba\$ it's not only about respecting the art of Hip Hop, but representing his own cultural identity.

"In my culture there are these people called griots which are storytellers," he said. "They told their

stories through music and poetry. I want to be like that, I want to take on that tradition."

BaRnaba\$ has been telling his story through music since the young age of 14 and recently released a new single, Holding On.

The single is a mix between his style of soulful and trap Hip Hop, giving listeners an insight into his life.

"There is freedom, you do what you want in music," BaRnaba\$ said. "There are no boundaries."

It is with this limitless energy that means these artists are creating music unheard of within the Northern Sound System (NSS) studios.

Nick O'Connor from NSS mentors young artists to support them through their creative process.

"The future of music in the north is in good hands," Nick said. "We are constantly amazed by new artists creating music that defies any music genre."
